Cowell, Roberta (1954). *Roberta Cowell's Story*.

Kennedy, Pagan (2007). *The First Man-Made Man: The Story of Two Sex Changes, One Love Affair, and a Twentieth Century Medical Revolution*.

Of the two major biographies that Roberta is included in, Kennedy's is by far preferable to Hodgkinson's. She covers more of Roberta's life and is able to include information that Hodgkinson felt obliged to omit. She is also far less insensitive in her depiction of the biography's transgender subjects, although far from perfect, and both biographies deadname and misgender both Roberta and Michael Dillon freely.

Hodgkinson, Liz (1989). *Michael, Née Laura*.

Hodgkinson's book was also published under the title *From a Girl to a Man: How Laura Became Michael*. As far as I can tell, there is no significant difference to the texts, but I only had access to the first edition.

Fisher, John Hayes, director (2015). *Sex Change Spitfire Ace*.

Fisher's documentary, in which Liz Hodgkinson speaks more openly about the primary sources for Roberta's relationship with Michael than she was able to in her book, was titled *The Sex Changes That Made History* for Australian release.
